This matter came before Jeff Patnode and Tana Wood, who are members of the Indeterminate Sentence Review Board (ISRB or the Board) on the above date for a release hearing in accordance with the provisions of RCW 9.94A.730. Ms. Robinson appeared in person. Testimony was provided by Department of Corrections (DOC) Classification Counselor (CC) Keeleyanne Rasmussen, and Ms. Robinson.

**BOARD DECISION:**

Based on the burden of proof set out in RCW 9.94A.730(3) and the totality of evidence and information provided to the Board, the Board does not find by a preponderance of the evidence that Ms. Robinson is more likely than not to commit any new criminal law violations if released on conditions. Consequently, the Board finds Ms. Robinson releasable.

**NEXT ACTION:**

Ms. Robinson will be released following a work release program participation on January 30, 2018. She must submit an ORP to the Board.

**JURISDICTION:**

RCW 9.94A.730, enacted in 2014, allows offenders who were under the age of 18 when they committed their crime(s) and were sentenced as adults to petition. Ms. Robinson has served approximately 242 months in prison and 294 days of jail time.

Luinda Robinson is under the jurisdiction of the Board on a February 13, 1997 conviction in King County Cause # 96-1-03088-7 for Murder in the First Degree. The time start is February 20, 1997. The minimum term was set at 300 months from a Sentencing Reform Act (SRA) range of 300 to 380 months (including the enhancement). The maximum term is Life on her OAA cause, but the Board only has her until her confinement maximum of April 30, 2021.

**NATURE OF INDEX OFFENSE(S):**

Originally, the description from law enforcement investigators and that of the Ms. Robinson are at odds with each other. Ms. Robinson reports that she went to the victim's apartment to watch movies with him and he made sexual advances. She states that she shot the victim in self-defense as she was afraid he was going to rape her. She stated that she tried to go to a neighbor's house to call 911, but that no one answered the doors, so she left.

The investigation reports that in the victim's day planner was an entry that he had met a girl named "Lulu" near Federal Way High School in the early morning, and that they exchanged numbers. Ms. Robinson called the victim later that day as noted by the voice message she left on the victim's answering machine asking him to call her back, or she would call him back around 4:00 p.m. At some time after 3:30 p.m. one of the victim's neighbors saw the victim and Ms. Robinson get out of the victim's car and enter his apartment. The report goes on to say that sometime prior to 8:00 p.m. Ms. Robinson took a .22 caliber handgun and fired a single shot into the back of the victim's head, killing him. The report noted that it was determined that Ms. Robinson had brought the gun with her to assist in robbing the victim, as there was no evidence of the victim owning a gun (no firearm was registered to him, no ammunition was in his apartment, etc.). After killing the victim she took his car keys, checkbook, and credit cards and

left the apartment in the victim's car. The same night and the next day Ms. Robinson continued to attempt to use the victim's credit cards and checkbook to obtain money from his account. She was also freely using his car to drive around.

Ms. Robinson now admits full culpability for this crime and her version is consistent with other reports of the crime, and she indicates it was a planned robbery.

**PRIOR CRIMINAL CONDUCT:**

Ms. Robinson has a juvenile record that consists of three non-felonies, one handled through diversion.

**HISTORY/COMMENTS:**

This is the first Board hearing for Ms. Robinson.

Ms. Robinson has a juvenile record that consists of three non-felonies, one handled through diversion.

Ms. Robinson has completed the following offender change groups and/or educational/vocational classes: Employment Training/Search; Life Skills; CI Job Hunter series; Small Business Skills; Reentry employment; Moving On – 06/23/2016; TRAC (Trade Related Apprenticeship Coaching Construction) – December 9, 2015; DV – December 2015; Healthy Relationships- December 2015; Healthy Relationships – October 2014; Communication – October 2014; Life Planning and Goal Setting – October 2014; Violence Prevention and Conflict Resolution – October 2014; Health – October 2014; Nutrition – October 2014; Parenting, and Self Esteem – October 2014; Personal Empowerment October 2014; Stress/Anger Management – June 2013; Basic Obedience (Pets) – April 2013; FEPPS Academic Reading and Writing Series Spring 2012; FEPPS Introduction to Sociology July 2012; Drafting June 2011; Pet Care Tech Program- November 2010; IF project; GED – August 2000; Peace Between People July 1998; and

Peace Between People January 1999 (Workshop for Training in Nonviolence Alternatives to Violence Project).

Ms. Robinson has been referred for Stress/Anger Management, Thinking for a Change, Beyond Trauma, and Roots of success. Ms. Robinson participates in Extended Family Visits with her mother. She continues to participate in Toast Masters, Making It work, Mock Interviews and resumed participation with the Prison Pet Partnership program.

CC Rasmussen provided testimony regarding Ms. Robinson's behavior, programming, as well as release plans for Ms. Robinson. She stated she has known Mr. Robinson since Ms. Robinson came to WCCW in 1997. CC Rasmussen provided a very favorable report on Ms. Robinson, stating she has been a model inmate while in prison, with her last infraction being in 1998. She stated that Ms. Robinson has taken advantage of all appropriate programs with the intent of becoming a better person. CC Rasmussen also stated Ms. Robinson has maintained employment and always receives favorable reviews from her supervisors. CC Rasmussen stated that Ms. Robinson intends to access transitional housing in King County and hopes to release from work release. She also said that Ms. Robinson's mother resides in Seattle as well and is the back-up release plan.

Ms. Robinson provided a disclosure of her index offense that matched file material. She provided good context for what was happening in her life at the time and described herself as an "out of control" teenager. She provided a clear description of her thinking related to what was a planned robbery. She also clarified that her prior stories of the victim having been sexually aggressive with her were not true. She stated that she went to the victim's home with the intent of taking his property to include his car. She said she had not planned to kill her victim but that once in the circumstance of the robbery, that occurred to her to be the best course. She appeared to have appropriate remorse and could describe the "selfish thinking" and behavior that she had at the time period of her offense.

**INFORMATION CONSIDERED:**

In preparation for Ms. Robinson's hearing and its decision in this case, the Board completed a review of her ISRB file. The Board considered all information contained in that file, including but not limited to: information provided by the sentencing court/prosecutor; the most recent DOC facility plan; information regarding institutional behavior and programming; any letters of support and/or concerns sent to the Board; the Pre-Sentence Investigation report; and the Psychological Evaluation dated October 26, 2016 by Deborah Wentworth, Ph.D. The Board also considered the testimony of the witnesses.

**REASONS:**

This was a deferred decision following a full Board discussion using a structured decision-making framework that takes into consideration: the statistical estimate of risk, criminal history, parole/release history, ability to control behavior, responsivity to programming, demonstrated offender change, release planning, discordant information, and other case specific factors. Based on the requirements of RCW 9.94A.730 (3) the Board finds Ms. Robinson releasable at this time.

Dr. Wentworth notes in her assessment dated October 26, 2016, the following: "If based primarily on criminal and infractions history, Ms. Robinson would be considered to be in the 'low to moderate' range for risk of reoffending after release. However, overall risk assessment may benefit from taking into consideration of dynamic factors such as 20 years of no serious infractions, and the lack of current biological/neurological development risk factors that were present as an adolescent and young adult. Under these parameters and accounting for the results of the SAPROF, the risk of reoffending would best be seen as in the 'low' range."

The Board believes that Ms. Robinson has worked hard during her time in prison to understand the factors contributing to her crime and to improve her decision making so as to not commit future crimes. She has taken full responsibility for her role in the murder and appears to be remorseful and also understands that she was a young adolescent girl that made those decisions.

She has participated in a large number of programs and has been a model inmate during her time in the DOC. Ms. Robinson could have released on her ERD without being under the Board. When asked why she petitioned the Board, she said she wanted to take responsibility for her crime and tell the true story of what occurred on that day.

The Board would like to see Ms. Robinson transferred to a work release program in King County as she plans to release to Seattle transitional housing and she has been accepted into the Fare Start program.
