**SUBJECT:** CBCC COVID-19 Weekly Update Memo

Clallam Bay Correction Center (CBCC) is just past our fourth week of outbreak status and we continue to remain diligent in managing potential COVID-19 exposure for both staff and the incarcerated population. This week we tested A unit, B unit Green pod, E unit, F unit, and H unit (housed in C unit).

The results from our facility-wide testing this week have identified an additional seven (7) incarcerated individuals that tested positive for COVID-19, including one (1) out of A unit, four (4) out of H unit (C unit) and two (2) out of high-risk quarantine (B unit Green pod). At this time, CBCC remains on Facility Wide Outbreak status with restricted movement protocols in effect.

Current quarantine or isolation protocols are still in effect for the following areas:

- A unit remains on quarantine status
  - o A unit Red pod is being used for close custody isolation cases
- B unit Green pod is identified for high-risk quarantine cases
- C unit now houses H unit quarantine and isolation cases
  - o C unit Red pod is being used for medium custody isolation cases
- F unit remains on quarantine status with one (1) individual remaining on isolation

The remaining units (B, D, G, I and J units) will remain on restricted movement due to COVID-19. F unit had no new positive cases this past week, and if they continue to have no new positive cases in the testing next week, they may be able to be removed from quarantine status.

I want to thank you for your commitment to remaining vigilant with the COVID-19 protocols. We can expect to continue progress in reducing potential exposures and the amount of time it will take to get back to a new normal with our operations. These protocols include, but are not limited to, cohorting in the dayrooms and shower/bathroom areas, serial testing our incarcerated population, and an increased awareness to Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) protocols, cleaning, sanitizing, disinfecting, and social distancing.
