A regular meeting of the Indeterminate Sentence Review Board was held in the ISRB Office Building located at 4317 Sixth Avenue SE, Lacey, commencing at 9:00 a.m.

- C. **Chair's Report**
 - **Legislation**
 - **HB 1866 – 2017-18** – Reviewing elderly incarcerated offenders for possible early release. This bill was sponsored by Representatives Pettigrew, Appleton, Hudgins, Kagi, Fitzgibbon, Robinson, Tharinger, Ormsby, McBride and Santos. A Public hearing was scheduled in the House Committee on Public Safety on January 18, 2018 at 8:00 a.m. Ms. Rongen was asked to attend and be available for questions.
 - Allows certain elderly offenders over the age of 50 to petition the Indeterminate Sentence Review Board (ISRB) for early release after serving 20 years in prison.
 - Mandates community custody for released offenders for a minimum term of three years and a maximum term of up to the original sentence imposed by the court.
 - Requires the ISRB to report to the Legislature on release information and possible recommendations for expansion by December 1, 2022.

 - **HB 1789 – 2017-18** – Concerning rehabilitated offenders. – This bill was sponsored by Representatives Jinkins, Pettigrew, Frame, Stambaugh, Ortiz-Self, Fitzgibbon, Macri, Ormsby and Gregerson. A Public hearing was scheduled in the House Committee on Public Safety on January 18, 2018 at 8:00 a.m. Ms. Rongen was asked to attend and be available for questions.
 - Requires the Sentencing Guidelines Commission (SGC) to contract with a consultant to study sentencing laws and practices and make recommendations to the Legislature and the Governor. The original bill included a component for a community review board which was taken out. A third proposed substitute was dropped which includes a

community review board of elected members from eleven different groups. The review would include offenders that have served 20 years and do not fall under the purview of the ISRB. This also includes the study of sentencing laws by the SGC.

D. Board Member Reports

Ms. Balmert attended the Sentencing Guidelines Commission (SGC) Meeting on Friday, January 19, 2018 in Ms. Rongen's stead. The SGC discussed SB 6160 - Revising conditions under which a person is subject to exclusive adult jurisdiction and extending juvenile court jurisdiction over serious cases to age twenty-five. A presentation on the Lead Program was also made.

E. Community Concerns – Community Concerns Meeting – Victims/Survivors met in-person with the Board Members to provide a statement on how the crime has affected their lives and to voice any concerns regarding the offender's release.

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
