- WC visiting has seen large numbers of visitors in the recent months, they are asking visitors to show up a little earlier to help make sure that processing goes smoothly and they can get into the visiting room on time.
- Reimagining Visiting is a new program; our visiting team and Sgt. Harvey are working with the HQ's team on making it work at WSP.

Andrea – when I came in for visiting a week or two ago, spoke with Sgt. Harvey and updated with him the Local family council brochures.

Brad – Sgt. Harvey is on vacation, but we did look over it together and I appreciate your help with updating it. I will speak with him when he gets back about getting it printed.

CUS Chris O'Dell -

- Quad 1 Delta/Echo they are running weekly Black Prisoner Caucus (BPC) out of the education area.
- The BPC Book club is running weekly out of education building.
- Delta is getting large scale puzzles in. When they are completed, they are matted and framed and will be used for decorations.
- They are working on an ice cream fundraiser.
- They are working on a weekly/monthly tournament with prizes purchased with funds from IIBF (Incarcerated Individual Betterment Funds) they are also looking in to working with SPL (Sustainable Practices Lab) on setting up outdoor tournaments in the future, probably things like football etc.

Brad Bowman -There are pictures in the newsletter of updates to East Complex. 20 hanging baskets were added last year and they have added 19 more this year. 15 outside planter boxes have been added around the East Complex facility. Updates (Associate The community garden is doing well. Superintendent Brad Bowman) Outside seating areas have been added to units 10 & 8, they have had a really good positive effect.

	 API for south and East complexes are coming up. 4th of July events were held in all areas, they are working on scheduling an art show in Medium custody (Victor/Williams) with members from the community. 	
	 CI Manager Marker's specialty is in food service but he does have information on all of the areas of CI. Food services deliver about 6600 meals a day which included special diets, religious, and medical needs. Laundry processes 25,000 pounds of laundry a week, they have 10 dryers. CI License plates has delivered 3.2 million plates since moving and opening in SPL (Sustainable Practices Lab) in 2024. Commissary is putting out about 8 deliveries a week across the facility. They do have an indigent program that does a lot of good. It provides toilet paper and other toiletries to those that don't have monetary assistance or jobs. 	
Correctional Industries Update (Correctional Industries Manager Phillip Marker)	 Working on art pieces in the kitchen in West Complex to spruce up the place. With help from food services, they have been having a good bit of food coming in from the facility gardens about 1400 lbs. of cucumbers were harvested recently. Partnered with staff at the facility to set up a 15-man crew, working on getting this produce processed out to the facility. The cantaloupe and melon that we ordered have arrived and has been cut and is really to go out to the units. We have a medium unit (Victor/William) food group. Daily 	
	 we deliver about 550 meals just in the medium units. They chose 5 individuals from each group (unit) that they try to meet with on a monthly basis. They just had their second meeting. There is a newsletter that comes from Headquarters about the Correctional Industries food program and the link is below: https://doc.wa.gov/sites/default/files/2025-06/700-NE002-0625.pdf They are cutting down on the breaded fish, as it is not well liked due to the quality. Working on improving the breading and other details for the future.

- Next Steps:

- Topic:

 - The population want more jobs. Many of the population has child support and LFO's that they work to pay, and some must wait longer periods to get a job.

 - Ultimately the reason for the lockdown is to free up staff to respond if needed.

- Maintenance cannot stop and respond every time a breaker pops.

- Individuals are having to wait 2-4 months to receive a tablet.
- Tablets are not coming with chargers.

- Issues with the Securus rep not being responsive.

Next steps:

- Securus is a contracted to group for DOC.
- Contract the Securus rep with issues.
- o Report issues to the Unit Manager so a report can be made.
- Have family and supports advocate about this issue at the Local Family Council meetings.

Carol – wondering more about fundraisers, family members are sending money in, so the Incarcerated can participate. Why are we sending money to put on their spendable accounts instead if it could be put in a different account, since they take so much out of the spendable accounts?

Brad – fundraisers are usually incentive based, so if they have a pizza that is usually 10, we put it at 15, this is usually to raise money for something in the unit or shared area, like improvements or fun items. As far as the amount that is taken out of the spendable accounts, it is dependent on the policies and codes that are at the state level and not something we have any control over.

Round Table Questions & Answers

Carol – wondering if there is a way that it could be placed into another account, that we would have more access to the money since less would be taken out.

Brad – unfortunately we are forced by policy to use specific accounts and work within the bounds of tax code and RCW's. If changes are to be made you would need to work on having the RCW changed at the state level with the legislature.

Carol – wanting to know more about lock downs

Brad – GVRS (Group Violence Reduction Strategy) is a close custody program, it is only for Close custody for WSP and CBCC (Clallam Bay) as they are the only facilities with Close Custody. If there is a 2 on 1

incarcerated individual fight, a staff assault, or a weapon is present during a fight. The area involved goes on lockdown. It's usually a 24–48-hour period. We investigate the event and those that are associated with the issue can have sanctions placed on them. It is a mandatory process. In other units when they have lockdowns, it is to make sure that there aren't going to be any further issues and that they can get back to normal operations.

Carol – when she did research on GVRS it was more information about the community-based side of things.

Robert – it's based on David Kennedy's work from Chicago and has been adapted to work in our environment.


Brad – on behalf of the facility thank you for being a part of this group and working with us to try and help solve issues. Thank you for taking an active part in these meetings.


FOOD SERVICE — MORE THAN JUST MEALS

A Note from the Administrator

Each day, our teams from 11 facilities prepare meals for over 13,000 individuals across Washington. That's no small task, and it speaks to the strength, professionalism, and persistence of the people who show up, shift after shift, to make it happen. Whether you're managing inventory, helping to lead a team, in the trenches cooking, or jumping in to cover where needed, thank you.

Food service is more than just meals, it's a system that supports health, safety, and meaningful structure where you live. It's also a place where real job skills are being built. If you're interested in working in the food service department, where you can learn food safety, sanitation, teamwork, and general job readiness, please send your name and DOC number on a kite to the local kitchen and Jobs department. If there's an opening and you meet the criteria, you will be interviewed and hired as allowed.

We value people who want to contribute. There's important work being done in our kitchens every day, and there's room for more, and for you to be a part of it.



FRESHNESS FIRST: BREAD & TORTILLAS UNDER REVIEW

We've received consistent reports about issues with the freshness of bread and tortillas at several sites. In response, we're taking a closer look at shelf-life expectations, handling and internal storage practices. We're also reinforcing expectations with suppliers and using your direct feedback to guide those conversations.

We have found a NEW, better tortilla for you! We ran a pilot test at WSP and everyone loved it. You should be seeing the new Sky Ranch tortilla at your facility in the coming months.

Keep submitting your observations. They're not just complaints, they are data points that help us improve quality statewide.

QUALITY SNAPSHOT: WHAT WE ARE MONITORING

This quarter's quality assurance focus includes areas Food Service workers can help with:

- FIFO Rotation: "First in, first out"
 isn't just good practice—it's essential
 for controlling cost and limiting spoilage. If you
 see that product is not getting rotated point it
 out to your supervisor and let them know so
 it can be addressed.
- Bulk Labeling: Make sure every opened or transferred product is dated and clearly labeled.

NUTRITION CORNER: SUMMER FOCUS ON HYDRATION

As warmer months set in, we are reminding staff and incarcerated workers alike to prioritize hydration, especially those working near hot equipment or on outdoor assignments. Your local facility will likely be adjusting seasonal produce offerings to include more hydrating foods like melon and cucumbers.

VARY YOUR VEGGIES



The vegetable group is an important part of our day. Did you know that vegetables are organized into 5 subgroups based on nutrients that we need to eat throughout the week? The subgroups are dark green, red and

orange, beans/peas/lentils, starchy, and other vegetables.



Focus on Dark Green

The dark green subgroup includes broccoli and leafy greens like romaine, kale, spinach, arugula, and collard greens. Greens are rich in antioxidants, B vitamins, vitamin K, and fiber. Despite their color, green peas and green beans don't belong to this subgroup.

FALL MENU CHANGES: LESS SEAFOOD, MORE FAVORITES



Looking ahead, we are planning a full menu revision for rollout in September or October. Based on feedback and consumption trends, we will be reducing seafood offerings by about 50%. These will be replaced with items that have consistently rated higher in popularity and satisfaction, while still meeting our nutritional guidelines.
